The calendar of prisoners was very heavy, and their trials were not concluded till Thursday morning. The awful sentence of death was passed on the following prisoners, 17 in number James Mitchell, for having, in the night of the 23d of February, broken into and robbed the parish church of Tisbury of the communion table cloth and the pulpit cloth. Of the prisoners sentenced to death, all have been reprieved excepting William Gale, for sacrilege who is to be executed on Tuesday the 24th instant.

On the 13th of August, the prisoner Target brought the mare and a pony to the Obelisk Livery Stables, St. George's-fields, for sale, and left them there. Shortly afterwards he returned with the other prisoner, a youth of 19, and took the mare away and on the 16th of August he sold her for £6 to a pork butcher in Aylesbury Street, Clerkenwell. On the next day the prisoners were apprehended. The prisoner Target, who lived in the prosecutrix's neighbourhood, now confessed the fact of the robbery and endeavoured to implicate his companion, but there being no evidence against the latter, he was acquitted but the former was found Guilty - Death.

Childred sold to Tisbury Man

At the late Plymouth fair, two Esquimaux savages, as they were called, were exhibited. It being strongly suspected that there was some deception in the exhibition, the proprietor of the show, as well as the two human beings themselves, were brought before the magistrates at the Guildhall. They proved to be a boy and girl, about 10 or 11 years old, who spoke not a word. The man said he received them from a master of a vessel at Liverpool, and he was to return them next spring; he stated his name to be James Sanger, of Tisbury, Wilts.

The boy and girl were sent to the workhouse, where they were cleaned and well clothed, but they were still silent, eating raw meat freely, and refusing that which was dressed. On the following evening, as they were being washed, they spoke to the nurse in English. This was communicated to the officers of the establishment, who visited them, and they then related the following particulars.

They are brother and sister; their father and mother are dead; the former was a mulatto, and their mother a white woman. Shortly after the death of their parents, they were sold by their aunt, with whom they lived, to Sanger, for two guineas; this was about Christmas last, and since that period they have been exhibited in the manner they were in Plymouth fair. They were forced to eat raw meat, and were ordered not to speak. They both stated that Sanger behaved to them in a very inhuman manner, and that it was for fear of him that they did not speak for so long a period in the workhouse.

These particulars being stated to the Mayor, he ordered Sanger to be taken into custody, but he had started off. His wife and her brother, who travelled with him, are in custody, and officers are despatched to apprehend him. The woman acknowledges buying the children. The children say, when their parents were living, they esided in Rosemary-lane, London: they are now very communicative, and eat as other children. Their heads are very much bruised, which theys tate arose from blows given them by Sanger.
