All the units of the Monmouthshire Regiment were of the Territorial Force.

1/2 Monmouth were the Pioneers for the 29th Division providing trench digging, wiring, road and 'hard point' construction and repair, duck boarding, tramway maintenance and taking materials to the front line.



The Battle of the Lys, Spring 1918

On April 12<sup>th</sup> the Germans made a concerted attempt to capture Hazebrouk, a major Allied logistics centre. The town held out when the Australian 1<sup>st</sup> Division halted the German advance five miles from the town centre. However, between April 10<sup>th</sup> and April 14<sup>th</sup> British troops had been in a precarious position; this was when Haig issued his famous speech ... "with our backs to the wall, and believing in the justice of our cause, each of us must fight on to the end."

First Battle of Kemmel 17 - 19 April 1918 was a phase of the Battle of the Lys; it was at this battle that Charles Lampard lost his life. The gains at the Battle of Lys were the last the Germans made in WW1.
