1700-1799

- 1740 Birth**
The Lady of Mr Arundel, son and heir of Lord Arundel of Wardour, of a son and heir.
The Scots Magazine Friday 7 March 1740
- 1746 Died**
Yesterday morning, died at Richmond, the Right Hon Henry Lord Arundel, of Wardour Castle, and Count of the Sacred Roman Empire
Derby Mercury Friday 27 June 1746
- 1756 Died**
Last week, at Wardour Castle in Wilts, the Right Hon Henry Lord Arundel, of Wardour, a Roman Catholic Peer, of an ancient family
Derby Mercury Friday 24 September 1756
- 1769 Died**
Last week, at his house near Wardour Castle, in Wiltshire, Mr Ch. Butler, head steward to the Right Hon Lord Arundell
Kentish Gazette Wednesday 07 June 1769
- 1771 Accident**
We hear, that a few days since as Lady Arundel was driving herself in her chair, at Wardour Castle, the horses took fright and threw her Ladyship out, by which melancholy accident she broke her leg.

- 1772 Quarry Accident**
Last Wednesday morning, as the labourers, 12 or 14 in number, employed in the quarry at Wardour-castle, near Shaftesbury, were at breakfast in a shed built for holding their tools, the stones that hung over unfortunately fell in upon them, to the quantity of 30 tons, by which one of the labourers was crushed to death, and three others slightly wounded.

- Renunciation**
They write from Shaftesbury, that on Sunday last the Rev Mr Austin Jenison, formerly a popish priest and chaplain to Lord Arundell of Wardour Castle, preached a most excellent sermon in the parish church of Lower Donhead, wherein he declared his abhorrence of the principles and practices of the church of Rome, and totally renounced the errors of popery, as being contrary to sense, reason and revelation, and was very much admired by a numerous congregation.

- 1776 Shocking Death**
One day last week, as a locksmith from Birmingham, who had been some time working at the Hon Lord Arundel's at Wardour castle, was mending a lock at the top of a stair case, he fell from thence to the bottom and dashed his brains out.

- 1777 General Quarter Sessions, Warminster**
John Osman for stealing a quantity of wine, the property of Lord Arundell, at Wardour, ordered to be whipt
Salisbury & Winchester Journal Monday 21 July 1777
- 1782 To be Sold**
A leasehold estate lying in the parish of Tisbury held on two good lives under Lord Arundel, consisting of two tenements, a garden, orchard, and a meadow, about an acre and a half. For a sight of the premises apply to William Burton the tenant, and for further particulars apply to Thomas Bowles of Chilhampton near Wilton.

- 1783 Phenomenon at the Lake**
Tuesday, the 26th ult. as a Labouring Man was busied near the Lake at Wardour Castle, the seat of Lord Arundell, he was suddenly alarmed with a rushing noise, familiar to that of several coaches driving furiously upon a pavement, and immediately after the water was lifted up to a considerable height in a volume and instantly sunk again. The man is a person of veracity and related the particulars of this phenomenon to several people of the house the same hour.

- 1784 Violent Attack**
Saturday evening, the 13th instant, as James Cross, of Tisbury, wheelwright, and James Odney, of Teffont Evias, sawyer, were travelling from Fern to Tisbury, a quarrel ensued near Wardour Park, whereon Odney struck at Cross violently with his axe, and cut off two fingers and part of his right hand, which he had held up to prevent his being cleft in twain, and which he very narrowly escaped, as the instrument cut through coat and waistcoat and grazed his skin.

- Great Joy**
On Thursday the Lady of James Everard Arundell, Esq and eldest daughter of the Right Hon. Lord Arundell, of Wardour, was happily delivered of a son and heir, to the great joy of that truly noble family.

- 1786 Treasure**
A fortunate discovery was lately made by a poor boy in a barn at Wardour, in this county. The lad was employed in catching rats, when treading upon a hollow place, he was induced to examine it, and there found a stone trough containing various gold and silver coins and a gold ring, intermixed with earth, to the amount of about 100/. The major part was of the coinage of Charles 11 and consisted of guineas, crown pieces and other silver money.

- 1788 Died**
A few days ago died at Wardour Castle, the seat of the Right Hon Lord Arundell, Mr Wheble, his Lordship's domestic priest. A gentleman universally beloved and respected by all that knew him; endued with Christian virtues, he was the true friend to the friendless, whatever their persuasion, and in charity with all mankind.

- 1799 Garden Robbery**
Whereas some person or persons did, in the night of Thursday the 25th of July instant, enter the gardens of the Right Hon Lord Arundell, at Wardour Castle, and stole thereout large quantities of cucumbers, currants, strawberries and other fruit, and did great damage to the melon plants and fruit trees. Whoever will give information of the offender or offenders, shall, on conviction, receive ten guineas reward, on application to C Bowles, of Shaftesbury, Steward to Lord Arundell
