

War Diary, 2nd Battalion Wilts Regiment 21 Brigade, 7 Division

12th March 1915

Just at the moment the rations were arriving, about 5.30am, the Germans carried out a bomb attack along the trench. This attack drove back C Coy and forced part of it into A Coy's trench; the end of A Coy's trench was uncovered by this attack so that A and part of C Coy were driven into the British trenches. Exactly what happened was not known at this time and it was believed that A Coy had been captured. The German advance was easily stopped by D Coy. C Coy organised a new attack and made good progress assisted by the bombers of the 2 Yorks. But coming under a heavy machine gun fire they were again driven back. These attacks were most unfortunate as they prevented the issue of water and rations. Still C Coy got theirs and D Coy got a rum issue. 10.30am. The artillery bombardment and, about 10.15am, a new bombing attack was started along the German trench. Lt Morison who led the attack was killed at once so the CO organised another and led them out. This time the attack was successful. About 350 were captured by a mixed detachment, chiefly Wilts.

"In ever loving memory of our dear sons and brothers Victor and Fred Jolliffe who were killed in France. Two lonely years have passed away since our great sorrow came, two noble heroes true and brave, peacefully asleep

in soldiers' graves, could we have only said goodbye it would not have seemed so hard. In Jesus keeping they are safe. Never forgotten by their sorrowing father, mother, sisters and brothers." Western Gazette, Friday June 15, 1917
