

the supporting wave during the 29th Division's attack on Beaumont Hamel and, like the leading battalions, the Middlesex advanced into withering German machine gun fire. A few men reached the German barbed wire, but got no further; most were cut down or trapped in no man's land.

After nightfall those that were pinned down near the German wire were rounded up and made prisoners of war.

There were some 60,000 British casualties by the end of that dreadful day; 20,000 were fatalities. Of these, the Middlesex Battalion suffered 522 casualties. 1^{st} July 1916 was an unparalleled disaster in British military history.

War Diary, 16th Battalion Middlesex Regiment, France, 8th July 1916

"Battalion takes over trenches ENGELBELMER Sector (KNIGHTSBRIDGE) from 2^{nd} Hants Regt & South Wales Borderers. Relief completed by 7pm. Casualties, o.r. wounded 3."

Alfred Seaborne was one of the three men wounded on 8 July 1916. He died of "paralysis" the next day at 35 Casualty Clearing Station Doullens.
