War Diary (summary) 2<sup>nd</sup> Bn Wiltshire Regiment France, near Chambrecy, 31 May 1918

£9.10.01d War Gratuity paid to Harry Littlecott (father) An order arrived from 56 Brigade that the Battalion is to return to its position SW of BLIGNY; remained in this position until 5pm when the Brigade Major brought instructions to counter-attack the farm on the river due north of CHAMBRECY and the high ground north west of CHAMBRECY village. The CO and Adjutant reconnoitred the position and assembled the Battalion for the attack, launched at 7.20pm. Very considerable MG fire was met with from each flank, combined with Heavy Artillery fire, but the Battalion, personally led by the CO, pressed on to its objective, which it reached in due course, joining up with the French on the left flank. This position was rapidly consolidated under heavy fire & the remnants of the Battalion reorganised. Our casualties were rather heavy, only 5 officers remaining and about 120 men.

LITTLECOTT, REGINALD GEORGE, L.-Corpl., No. 24612, 2nd Batta. (99th Foot) The Duke of Edinburgh's (Wiltshire Regt.), yst. s. of Harry Little-cott, of 72, Wise Lane, East Knoyle, Shepherd, by his wife, Mary Jane, dau. of William Tanner; b. Cholderton, co. Wilts, 30 March, 1898; educ. East Knoyle School; was Assistant Scout Master 1st East Knoyle Troop of Boy Scouts; enlisted in the Wiltshire Regt. 27 May, 1916; served with the Expeditionary Force in France and Flanders from 4 May, 1917; was reported wounded and missing after the fighting at Chambreey, and is now reported to have been killed in action on or about 31 May, 1918. He is buried at the Collection of Graves in Groups in a thin belt of firs nearly on top of La Group North of Chambreey, Fourth Group, ten yards north-west of side of firs, about ten miles south-west of Rheims, France; warm. Rheims, France ; unm.

Mr and Mrs Littlecott have officially been informed that their son Reginald who was reported missing since May 31<sup>st</sup> is now confirmed to be dead. Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved. Western Gazette October 25, 1918
